
Key to landscape features

ROUTE FINDING

You will need a basic understanding of maps and the ability to follow them. The walks can be followed in either direction, but if you go in the same way as the arrows, you won't have to turn the map around to fit the landscape.

SOHAM to ELY

61/2 miles (10.5km) - 3-4 hours



ELY CATHEDRAL

Soham's reopened rail station provides a convenient starting point for a riverside walk to Ely along the banks of Soham Lode and Gt Ouse, the cathedral ('the ship of the fens') dominating the landscape ahead.

Soham's station also gives access to local features of historic and natural interest including the impressive church tower of 1500-4 and beautiful hammerbeam roof straddling the nave. The famous steelyard is opposite the church. The town's Millennium Walks and Art Trail invites further exploration, including a feature commemorating the great explosion of 1944 when a wagon in a trainload of bombs caught fire. The bravery of three railwaymen who managed to detach the wagon saved the town from catastrophe. All trains on the Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds, Ely and Peterborough route call at Soham, including Sundays.




